And so we slip into September and the beginning of autumn. We've had quite a summer with a really late start, the hottest July on record, and August (?) – well, even Vicars can't look ahead that specifically, for I am writing this on 2<sup>nd</sup> August! Of course we should not be surprised by the change of season: the signs have been all around us. Bright green leaves greying-up, dahlias and chrysanthemums, ripening apples, evenings drawing in, using the headlights on our cars again, logs being stored, corn harvesting complete in many places. Autumn may mean a slowing down for nature, but it can be the very opposite for many of us. Holidays are over and schools are back, gardens need "putting to bed", and meetings begin. In the life of the community, activities in the local hall pick up again, the Church plans its Harvest Thanksgiving, and may have Christmas arrangements in mind.

With all this going on, it's very easy in an attempt to take the pressure off, to look backwards. Remembering and reminiscing do not need any planning or commitment, just somebody with whom to exchange Similarly to maintain the status quo needs minimal memories. research, the quickest decision and no action. There is quite rightly a big drive going on to reduce energy consumption, or put slightly differently, to make more efficient use of existing energy. This is looking ahead and endeavouring to secure the future for humankind. It will involve switching things off whenever possible rather than leaving them on, reusing and adapting rather than making new, and especially thought before action. All rather difficult when it's so much easier just to carry on as we are, hiding behind science not proven and keeping up with other wasteful or developing nations. "This is the way things are, we've always done it like this" we say,

"There's no need to look ahead, just enjoy the past".

All this, I think, points us to spending much more time looking forwards, much less to looking backwards. ## **Bride Valley Gardening Club**

Jobs to do now:

*Vegetables* – plant out cabbages for spring cutting, lift and store carrots and beetroot.

*Fruit* – Thin out weak raspberry canes.

*Flowers* – Try collecting ripened seeds from some of your annuals and store in paper bags – not plastic as this would prevent the tissue from drying out properly and encourage the growth of moulds. Alternatively take cuttings from bedding plants, particularly geraniums. Start planting bulbs for spring flowering.

### **Puncknowle and Swyre Parish Council**

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held at 7.30pm in the Village Hall in Puncknowle on September  $5^{\text{th}}$  2006.

The first item on the agenda will be a visit from Mr Neil Allsopp, West Dorset District Council, who will be speaking and answering questions on the West Bexington Car park Structural Options appraisal Report. Villagers from West Bexington in particular are urged to attend and to ask as many questions as they choose. The five options considered are:-

- 1. "Do-nothing"
- 2. On going maintenance to retain the existing situation
- 3. Partial structural improvements (rock armour)
- 4. Minor/major structural improvement works (gabion baskets)
- 5. Major improvement works (King Piles)

On initial viewing, the consultants consider that scenario no 5 (to drive King Piles on approximately the same seaward edge as existing) would seem the preferred option since it maintains fairly closely the current alignment of the seaward edge and, since rock armour is not incorporated within the option, is the least visually intrusive.

There have been many problems in the car park throughout the summer which need to be aired whilst Mr Allsopp is with us.
