From the Rectory

It was very good to welcome the Marshall family to Burton Bradstock in early August – Doug and Jacqui are our link partners with the Church Mission Society, and they are based in Malta where (to quote them) they help 'asylum seekers recover their lives, serving those who have fallen through the cracks of society.' After a presentation to congregation members at St. Mary's and a lunch in the village hall, Doug and Jacqui and their children Chloe (3) and Ethan (5) came to the Rectory and we enjoyed a bubble-blowing session in the garden.

Here's young Ethan - in command of a chain of bubbles. It might be truer to say that the breeze was in command that fine afternoon. Ethan tried to blow his bubbles into existence, but it was the sea wind that took them, enlarged them and dispensed them. And those beautiful, ephemeral, wobbling globes of soapy fluid connected the five of us and delighted us - in a form of communication which needed no words or at least no carefully connected sentences. Of their work in Malta, the Marshalls say that 'language and cultural differences in communication cause unnecessary problems'; their basic approach to the asylum seekers they meet - many of



them displaced from Libya and Tunisia - is 'relational' – by which they mean an open and friendly approach which might lead to conversation, if that is possible. What was noticeable during their visit is how *easy* the Marshalls were to be with – we fell pretty much straight into bubble-blowing without any introduction to what we were going to do or ponderous explanation. Like all the best games it was spontaneous and joyous – and involved a communication which transcended language. One of the many possible fates befalling asylum seekers is *statelessness* – a position of nonbelonging, of lack of identification with any particular home soil. It seems to me that a gift that the Marshalls bring to the asylum seekers they help on Malta is a way of relating that need not require words – an openness and a willingness to share that relies on friendliness, love and body language more than it relies on verbal communication.

May God continue to bless them in their work (and play!)


LICENSING SERVICE FOR REVEREND SUE LINFORD

Archbishop Justin Welby and Archbishop John Sentamu issued a joint statement after the UK voted to leave the European Union. In it they said:

".... Unity, hope and generosity will enable us to overcome the period of transition that will now happen, and to emerge confident and successful. The opportunities and challenges that face us as a nation and as global citizens are too significant for us to settle for less.

"As those who hope and trust in the living God ..., Let us pray especially that we may go forward to build a good United Kingdom that, though relating to the rest of Europe in a new way, will play its part amongst the nations in the pursuit of the common good throughout the world."



JOBS TO DO IN SEPTEMBER

Choose and plant bulbs now but wait until November to plant tulips. Continue deadheading tender perennials to extend the flower display but be prepared to lift them before the first frosts. Clear any diseased material to prevent fungal spores overwintering in the soil. Sow hardy annuals for flowering next year. Divide herbaceous perennials. Plant out springflowering biennials. Plant out spring cabbages, garlic and autumn (Japanese) onion sets. Protect carrots with insect mesh as carrot flies are most damaging in late summer to autumn. Cut down fruited summer raspberry canes to ground level. Net ponds in preparation for leaf fall.





MERCHANT NAVY DAY - 3RD SEPTEMBER 2016

Fishing Fleet who lost their lives during the

On Saturday 3^{rd} September we shall be flying the Red Ensign - the flag flown by British Registered Merchant ships - from the flagstaff on St. Mary's Church, Litton Cheney.

The Tower Hill Memorial in London commemorates some 40,000 men and women of the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleets who died in both World Wars and who have no grave but the sea. Merchant Navy Day is an opportunity to remember their largely forgotten sacrifices and to salute the courage, contribution and losses faced by merchant seafarers and fishermen generally during two World Wars and the Falklands Conflict. Since January, the Weymouth, Portland & District branch of the Merchant Navy Association has been busy raising £15,000 in funds to cover the cost for a memorial to the memory of those of the Merchant Navy &





wars of the 20th Century. This memorial will be erected alongside the main war memorial and the Anzac memorial on Weymouth seafront hopefully in time for the Remembrance Day parade there this coming November.

Merchant Navy Day is also an opportunity to recognise the UK's on-going dependence on modern day merchant seafarers who are responsible for 95% of our imports, including half the food we eat. Far from home, sometimes frightened in heavy weather and often poorly paid, too often they are forgotten or invisible. This is despite the fact that no-one in the UK lives more than 70 miles from the sea.

If you look up and see the Red Ensign flying on Saturday 3rd September maybe you can spare merchant seamen a thought? That such a flag can flutter above a church tower firmly planted in a peaceful location is a reminder of the hope expressed in what might be called the 'seamen's psalm' (Psalm 107)- a hope of stilled waves and a glad calm and a safe haven at last.

HARVEST FESTIVAL will be celebrated on Sunday 2nd October at 11.00 a.m. Do come and join us to celebrate this time "of mellow fruitfulness" and bring your Harvest offerings. The service will followed by a "Bring and Share" lunch - a great spread is always on offer!



BELL RESTORATION PROJECT
