MONTHLY THOUGHT A letter from The Rt Revd Karen Gorham Bishop of Sherborne

I recently received a thank you letter from a 78 year-old lady from Bridport who was recently confirmed. She goes on to explain how she hopes to set an example to her family, and feels her calling at her stage in life to pray for peace.

The service of confirmation brings together seekers of all ages, wanting to step out and make a commitment to follow Jesus in their lives.

Earlier in September four teenagers were

confirmed in Maiden Newton, ready to step out into university life, wanting to share their faith with new friends.

It is encouraging to see God at work in individual lives.

We all have a story to share, and it is often easier to share it when our faith is awakened afresh and we feel energised to tell others of our experience.

Four enthusiastic young people have just launched out on a year's adventure in Poole testing a calling to ordination and I am sure their faith and eagerness will be infectious!

For many of us, however, faith has been kindled over the years and has become so much a part of us we tend to take it for granted.

We hope it rubs off on those we meet by our attitudes, values and priorities, as we aim to grow deeper ourselves by the weekly rhythm of worship.

That's all good, but those being confirmed remind me of the calling on all of us to share our faith and the joy we have found in the fellowship of the church because many are seeking meaning for their lives.

As we approach the season of Remembrance, maybe it's time to draw someone else in.

As the well known hymn says, 'How shall they call if they have never heard the gracious invitation of our Lord?'

SERVICE PATTERN

In September, Stephen was put on sick leave by the Archdeacon and in the days that followed, there was a fair degree of 'fire-fighting' in order to ensure that everything remained on track. We have now reached the stage where longer term plans can be put in place, which will remove uncertainty and ensure sustainability.

At a meeting of the Churchwardens last month, we looked at the provision of worship throughout the benefice during Stephen's illness. It was agreed that, whilst we could "draft in" support for the ministry team from outside in order to maintain the current service pattern, a far more sensible approach would be to instigate a few temporary changes. As a result, from November, there will be some adjustments to the type of service, the number of services, or the timing of a service in each of the churches. As different people lead worship throughout the valley, this will hopefully be a time of enablement and enrichment for us all; a time even for the discernment of new vocations.

Please continue to pray for Stephen, Frances and Evie.

MESSY CHURCH NEWS

We had a thought provoking harvest festival, thinking about people in various places who are hungry. In Chad the rains have failed (again) and there is no harvest. Children are dying of hunger. We heard about Yasmin aged 6, whose mother forages through ants nests to find a few grains that she can use to feed her children. We saw a film about the work that **Tearfund** is



funding to help communities cope better with the effects of climate change. Even in our country some people are hungry. Our harvest gifts and collection (see photo) were taken to Bridport food bank "Cupboard Love" run by St Mary's church.

In November we shall be meeting on Sunday 13th at **11.00** (please note **change of time!) as it's Remembrance Sunday**. We shall have a short, informal all age service centred on Remembrance. We hope to have a question and answer session with a former army chaplain.

Finally, some myth busting....Messy Church definitely isn't Sunday school. It's a real church service that is informal, suitable for all ages and stages of life. We sing hymns, we say prayers, we hear Bible stories, sometimes dramatised. We use modern English. It's certainly different but it's still recognisably church. Lucy Moore, who has been involved in the development of Messy Churches across the world, says:

"In a traditional church, we're sitting in rows listening to somebody at the front and we don't have feedback because there's no conversation there. Messy Church is about learning together, having lots of conversations and building relationships.....God is at work in it all. It's not just a flash in the pan. It's clearly a move of the Spirit in this generation"

FOLLOWING THE STEPS OF ST. PAUL.

Paul of Tarsus, early persecutor of the Church and eventually its greatest missioner and theologian is a fascinating story. Just how would the Church have developed without him and his restless desire to tell others of Jesus?

Paul undertook three great missionary journeys through Asia Minor, Greece and finally to Rome. He struggled against not only local opposition but also opposition from within the Church itself. These struggles are recorded in his letters which form the basis of much of the New Testament.

Paul's story is told by Luke in the book of Acts. Next September there is going to be a wonderful opportunity to visit many of the sites associated with Paul and his missionary journey to ancient Macedonia and Greece.

Andrew Evans, Team Rector at Bridport is experienced in leading holidaypilgrimages in the Mediterranean and Holy Land. He is planning to take a party to Greece in September next year, visiting many of the sites associated with Paul and his travels including Athens, Corinth, Philippi and Thessalonika. Also included is a visit to Delphi. When one hears Paul's words spoken in the very place to which they were addressed the New Testament truly comes alive. Reaffirming ones baptismal vows where Lydia, the first person to be baptised on the European continent, is a never forgotten experience.

BRIDE VALLEY GARDENING CLUB

At the Gardening Club's meeting in September Philip Gamble gave an illustrated talk about some of the 'Gardens of SW England'. Through his pictures and descriptions he encouraged us to visit the gardens and to take some of the ideas and apply them to our own situations.

Jobs to do in November

Divide congested hardy perennials such as asters and chrysanthemums. Insulate vulnerable perennials from frost by mulching with a thick layer of garden compost and protect planted containers by wrapping them in bubble wrap or bring them into an unheated greenhouse or conservatory. Similarly protect tender herbs either by bringing indoors or covering with fleece or cloches to keep them cropping well into winter. Sow sweet peas individually into deep pots or root trainers. Pot up lilies for next year. Bring prepared bulbs such as hyacinths into a well-lit area for flowers at Christmas. Sow broad beans and peas under cloches. Plant new rows of summer raspberries. Finish planting garlic cloves outside. Before lighting bonfires check they are clear of sheltering wildlife; clean out bird boxes; regularly clean bird feeders and bird baths.
