themed week with a Theatre Production from As One Theatre, looking at the incredible story of Mary Anning - covering everything from being struck by lightning as a child up to her battle to win recognition from the scientific community for her discoveries - the children were in no doubt afterwards how hard a life Mary had been through and how difficult it was for her as a woman to gain the plaudits and respect her incredible work and discoveries clearly merited. After the whole-school performance, Bredy and Eggardon also took part in a drama workshop where they themselves took to the boards to explore and convey the incredible discoveries Mary made at that time.

On Friday we also took the older children to Lyme Regis for the Fossil Festival organised across the weekend. There was an incredible range of speakers and presentations from organisations such as The Natural History Museum, Bristol University, The British Antarctic Survey, Steve Etches and Lyme Regis Museum. The children loved all the activities and talks and the experts were impressed with how much the children knew about evolution and the dinosaurs that lay under their feet!

On Wednesday we started our Forest School sessions with Rachel Ellman in our wildlife area - with each class building on their skills from last year when they also worked with Rachel. We are most grateful to Rachel for her sessions and knowledge about the Discovery Area as well as to Sian Hennessy for his contribution of woodchip to school for the paths in that area. We look forward to more sessions such as cooking and forest art as the weeks continue. We also continued with our whole class Violin lessons and the children are working towards a concert for parents at the end of this term. Lastly, on Wednesday we are delighted to report that the children were victorious in the Bridport Kwik Kricket tournament - winning all their matches. The children played brilliantly and also enjoyed the chance to compete against other schools after such a wet start to the summer.

The swimming pool also opened this week and the children are having lessons from both staff and Dan Drew, our local swim teacher, who is coming in on Mondays to work on the children's confidence and strokes. Thanks again to parents, the TSA, Cresta Leisure and Nick Bowring for all their help and support in getting the pool ready for the swimming this summer. Our sailing series after school on Mondays also starts this week and we are taking approximately 20 children to Portland Harbour for sailing for the next 6 weeks - so we hope for some sunshine and a gentle breeze or two as we learn the ropes (sheets)!

## Our Night Sky in July 2024

Saturn will be rising in the East at about 0130 and Mars at 0300. Jupiter is still lost in the morning Sunrise. Cygnus, the Swan and the Milky Way will be readily visible overhead.



Using the James Webb Space

Telescope (JWST), astronomers have seen

the first-ever look at the light of ancient stars shining around some of the biggest, brightest and oldest black holes in the universe.

Quasars - galactic cores containing active supermassive black holes - are among the most ancient things in the universe. As dust and gas accelerate toward the quasar's central black hole, the quasar emits such bright radiation - typically a thousand times brighter than the entire Milky Way - that astronomers have a hard time observing the fainter light of stars in the quasar's galaxy. This makes it challenging to study the galaxy's shape and mass, but for the first time, researchers at MIT have managed to unpick this mixture of signals and detect the faint stellar light from stars in galaxies around some of the oldest quasars in the universe. Their results, published on 6<sup>th</sup> May in The Astrophysical Journal, reveal that, relative to their host galaxies, these ancient supermassive black holes are around 100 times bigger than their counterparts in the nearby universe.

These results were possible thanks to JWST's superior sharpness and resolution. Over 120 hours of telescope time, the team observed six quasars, all estimated to be around 13 billion years old — some of the oldest objects in the universe.

## Bride Valley Book Club - Book Review

When God Was a Rabbit, by Sarah Winman

We enjoyed reading "When God was a Rabbit" despite some misgivings. For a first novel it



did the usual thing of trying to cover too much ground within the span of just one book. The story follows the lives of an unconventional family and their friends from London to Cornwall with later interludes in New York. The early childhood sections were especially good with laugh out loud vignettes such as an hilarious school nativity play. This is a novel about the love and enduring affection which binds family and friends. Ellie's family are quirky characters and all the more interesting because of this. The book falls into two halves - the childhood and early adolescence of Ellie and later with a gap of almost 20 years - Ellie's life as a young woman. There were instances of "creative writing project" discernible at times and a feeling of possibly genuine memories being embellished. Winman uses many real historical "markers" to punctuate her narrative and given that the main character's life span roughly coincides with our own - we recognised the resonance of these - the Silver Jubilee street parties, Diana's death, 9/11, and quite a few more.

We had mixed views about this - some of of us felt that these associative events were overcooked by the author - notably the brutal Beirut kidnapping of a friend and the trauma of 9/11 when Ellie's older brother, Joe, is believed lost forever. More interesting was the hint that Ellie herself had been prey to sinister grooming by an elderly neighbour. Much later in the novel this is explained in more detail and we felt it begged questions about both perpetrator and victim - about which the writer leaves us to make up our own minds.

There were fascinating characters created in this book - off beat bohemian individuals about whom we wanted to know more. Most heart-breaking was the childhood friend, Jenny Penny, a neglected and misunderstood girl destined for a dysfunctional adult life. We tended to agree that the novel's ending was a bit "all tied up in a neat bow" - Joe's unlikely resurfacing as an amnesiac months after 9/11, a dear elderly family friend regaining his sight after being hit on the head by a coconut (yes!) - and Jenny Penny's reincarnation as a writer after release from prison. Overall - a refreshing and original book.

Plans are in place to celebrate that 1000 years ago in 1024 King Canute wrote a charter giving the area known as Porteshamme to his manservant Orc. This original charter is stored in Dorset History Centre and this is the first written record that defines the area now known as Portesham. Abbotsbury will also celebrate its Millennium this year, however, the written record

has been lost. There is evidence of humans inhabiting this area since Neolithic times but this document is the first written record. To mark this important milestone both villages will hold a number of events throughout the year and some have already taken place. Bunting including our logo is already on display. Thank you to everyone who joined us for the Duck Race and Summer Party in support of our village hall on Sunday, June 9th, 2024. We were blessed with wonderful weather, and a great time was had by all.

#### The Archaeology at Bottle Knapp Cottage

In the Village Hall on Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> June, over 50 people attended a presentation by Martin Papworth from the National Trust, who discussed the findings from the 2019 excavation at Bottle Knapp. The presentation included videos showcasing the excavation process, the discoveries made, and the subsequent research, which encompassed carbon dating and DNA analysis. Three sets of bones were discovered, consistent with teenagers aged



13-18, as indicated by their unfused bones. The limbs were found in unusual positions. The skeletons were identified as two females and one male. Carbon dating placed the



bones between 750 500 BC, during the early Iron Age. These findings are unique, with no comparable records available. The DNA analysis has been integrated into international research, and the Bottle Knapp findings are frequently referenced due to their rarity. Isotope analysis suggested that the teenagers were likely local, with ancestors who had probably migrated across the Channel. The excavation was featured on the series "Digging for Britain".

The remains of Camp D10 in Wellbottom Wood are still clearly evident: about a dozen concrete bases of buildings and a few windowless walls still standing. D11 was in Bigwood, but of that no trace survives, perhaps because it may have been tented rather than built. The late Marshallsay brothers, who lived in Bigwood Lodge from 1938 till comparatively recently, held it that even in the times of shared endeavour in 1944, black American servicemen were segregated from their white comrades in arms in the camps, and that the more basic D11 had been theirs. They also held that the clump of trees not far from the road on the left at the top of White Hill. just beyond the entrance to Tom Foot's two farm tracks, had been planted over the site of an ammunition dump well away from both camps, to avoid an accidental detonation of any forgotten armaments caused by farm livestock or machinery afterwards. Be that as it may, Littlebredy can most definitely claim a share, however small, in supporting the mighty effort which led to the liberation of Europe and the destruction of the Nazi regime in 1944 and 1945.

But these resultant freedoms need defending, and until that Promised Day "when sin shall be no more", they must still be defended by our armed services, among whom is now numbered Flying Officer Josh Wilkinson, son of Glenn and Amanda in No. 1, Yew Tree Cottage. Having succeeded in his officer training and exams, Josh passed out at R.A.F. Cranwell on the 30th May, and his parents, grandparents and others in his family attended the formal Parade, Church Service and formal Ball to mark the transition. Many congratulations to him, and we trust that his R.A.F. career will go from strength to strength.

#### The Rev'd Andrew Salmon: 1930 - 2024

A few members of our Church congregations in the Valley joined many others of Andrew's family and old friends for his funeral in Wareham's Priory Church of Lady St. Mary on the 3rd June. Born into a clerical family in Jerusalem, his Christianity had been shaped into an evangelical form at Cambridge University in the 1950s, along with many others who possibly went on to attain greater eminence in the Church (but probably not on the golf course, hockey pitch or cricket field). His pastoral gifts lay in chaplaincy, and most of his career was spent first at Monkton Combe School near Bath, and then at Milton Abbey School, here in Dorset. It was from there that he came to devote the last few years of his ministry to live in Litton Cheney as Team Vicar of what was then called the Bride Valley Team.

Andrew was always an individualist on whom formality lay light. PCC Meetings for him were a burden to be endured (the fewer and shorter the better), but if cancelled for any reason, then better still. In his services, anecdotes, jokes and puns which had gone down well from the pulpit among teenage public-school boys were often recycled (sometimes to our bemusement) to more staid and mature village congregations in the valley. But behind an air of apparent insouciance from time to time, there lay a steelier faith, and when a wider issue or an individual parishioner's concerns merited a seriousness of approach, Andrew would not be found wanting and he could bring to bear a depth of sympathy and consideration, based on both scripture and experience.

In his time here, he was mightily supported and assisted by Monica, who predeceased him by only a few months after a period of ill health. She joined and encouraged many local organisations, especially those involving the schools and upbringing of children, and the memory of both of them should continue to be cherished in our community. To their four children, numerous grandchildren, and at least one great-grandchild, we send all sympathy and a shared sense of loss of two of life's great originals. Their example and their memories will not easily be forgotten. R.I.P.

### The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from Uncle Eustace

My dear Nephew Darren,

You should not complain about doing duty in other

churches when their clergy are on holiday. It is only in other churches that you will be appreciated. Beatification only comes from your own church on the day you leave - which is a way of firing a shot across the bows of your successor. I remember being greeted by a churchwarden on my first day here at St James the Least of All with the encouraging words: 'I've seen six Rectors of this parish; each one was worse than the last.' As the years have gone by, I am sure I will have entirely fulfilled his expectations.

No; when you visit another church, you will be told all the many defects of their own vicar, and whatever *you* do will be praised. Store up these memories for the day you return to your own patch – when you will then be told how outstanding your own temporary replacement has been and how congregations thrived in your absence.

Naturally, this gives you the right to make similar remarks about your own congregation in the churches you visit. Unfavourable comparisons with the bell ringers, vergers and congregational singing in your home patch to the superb standards in the church you're temporarily serving will be much appreciated. Just make sure that the church you are staffing is sufficiently far from your own that word will not get back to your home team.

It is a mistake I made only once. After filling in for a colleague, I happened to complement the choir on the singing of the anthem. Unknown to me, a tenor was the second cousin of my organist, who received a rather embellished story that I had compared my own choir back home unfavourably with theirs. On my return the following Sunday, all the hymns were played fortissimo and at double speed and the choir in rotation dropped hymn books throughout my sermon.

Inevitably, when you staff another church, you will be told: 'It's the normal Service.' It will be *nothing of the sort*. Hymns will appear in unexpected places, Sunday schools will enter and leave (and enter again) apparently at random, objects will be brought to you to be read from, placed on the altar or blessed – just as you were about to try and find the pulpit. In any case, wherever you are standing, you will find you should have been standing somewhere else. But not to worry - most mistakes will be forgiven - provided your sermon is short.



So - enjoy your visits to other churches. And above all, make sure that your temporary replacement is so spectacularly incompetent that your own people will welcome you back with open arms on your return.



Your help on this will be appreciated by the Village Correspondents and the Editor!





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




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
